


We have been learning about big and small in Maths. We made different size pizzas from scratch smelling and feeling them. We got to taste or smell them after and they were super yummy!



<u>Class 3.2</u>

Music at Sherbourne

Primary Phase:

Pupils have settled into the music room really well and are familiar with myself as their music teacher. We have been focusing on experiencing musical foundations and exploring them through a variety of instruments.

Classes have used shakers, drums and glockenspiels to play together as ensembles as well as exploring new instruments such as gongs, ocean drums and Soundbeams.

Pupils have also been singing and vocalising a number of Christmas songs and Carols ready for the festive season.



Secondary Phase:

Students have become familiar with myself and the music room and have studied core musical fundamentals such as rhythm and pitch. These have been explored through different contexts such as Pop and R&B as well as through different instruments such as keyboards, piano, djembe drums and xylophones.

Students are encouraged to participate through the use of microphones, working both as individuals and as groups.

Horticulture/Outdoor Learning

It has been a very busy term for us with lots of projects being worked on outside. It started with some groups working on clearing the raised beds in the allotment and getting them prepared for the growing season next spring. We planted our onion sets which can survive the cold winter months and learnt that garlic actually needs a frost to form the cloves. We have also been able to get our broad bean, pea and sweet pea seeds sowed and stored in the greenhouse.



In September we were able to harvest our first batch of Sherbourne Honey. A number of classes across school were able to take part in some of the processes this involved. From spinning the honey from the frames, sieving the honey and jarring it. We also learnt about the legal requirements for labelling our jars. We hope that our bees will provide us with a lot more honey next year. We entered our honey and honey products into The Coventry Bee Societies Honey Show and were delighted to win the 1st prize Trophy in the Novice Honey Category. **T**here has been a lot of planting of young tree saplings around school that we received from the Woodland Trust. Different classes have been involved in this project, not only have we been learning about the process of planting and protecting a young sapling but also beginning to learn about the environmental advantages of planting more trees.

We have also started a project that aims to provide year-round planting that will provide seasonal flowers both for pollinators and to aid curriculum learning. We have begun by planting a number of raised beds with bulbs that we hope will provide us with a lovely display in Spring.

Jodie Lynch Assistant Head - Key Stage 5 **K**ey Stage 5 have been joined on Friday's this term by Nicky Claybrook who is a job coach. A job coach is an individual who is employed to help people with disabilities learn, accommodate, and perform their work duties. A job coach may work with individuals one-on-one and/or in a small group. In addition to working on skills related to performing specific job tasks, a job coach also helps with interpersonal skills necessary in the workplace.

Nicky supports young people on supported internships and has been coming in, talking to pupils and also attending annual reviews to answer any questions parents/carers may have about supported internships.



A supported internship is a structured study programme based primarily at an employer. They are unpaid, and last for a minimum of six months. They are designed to help young people with an Education, Health and Care Plan to achieve sustainable paid employment by equipping them with employability skills through learning in the workplace. A successful supported internship will see the young person to move into paid employment at the end of their programme. Alongside their time at the employer, young people complete a personalised study programme which includes the chance to study for relevant qualifications in English and Maths. This will be through a specialist teacher and a job coach.

Last year we had one pupil who went on to do a supported internship in a nursery after she left school. This year we are hoping to have 5 pupils going onto a supported internship in areas they are interested in such as café, garages, maintenance crews and sports centres, when they leave school in July.


Wedge Workshop

We have been able to reflect on our practice and look at areas where we can develop for our next sessions, again gaining essential skills for life.





Pupils were surprised how few staff members actually bought newspapers.


We have continued to study newspapers both broadsheet and tabloids – pupils have been really interested in how the newspapers layout differs.
