Dear Families and Friends of Sherbourne,

We have had a wonderful year at Sherbourne Fields and our school community has much to be proud of. Challenges have been taken on and overcome, targets have been reached and often exceeded, success has been enjoyed and rightly celebrated and the achievements of our pupils are far and wide, with personal development being at the heart of our school.

Our wonderful children in EYFS and Year 7 who joined us this year have consistently made us proud by settling into their new school and their new classes very quickly.

The Primary Dept have enjoyed a record number of trips and visits to support their curriculum and bring their learning to life this year – these have included visits to local parks, shops, the Butterfly Farm in Stratford and for some Twycross Zoo and the West Midlands Safari Park. These trips support the learning outcomes in our English and Maths curriculums as well as helping our pupils develop their social and independent living skills. Some of our pupils have been to visit the newly opened Charter House, in Coventry to learn about the significance of these historical buildings as part of our local History investigations. Visits to places of worship to support My Religion, My Culture have included visits to a Mosque, Temple and a local church. Our Rivers and Canals focus in Humanities has been supported by visits to Longford Canal Lock, the Coventry Canal Basin and the River Sherbourne and when investigating Coastal features and the effects of ocean plastic pollution Grey Class ventured to Gibraltar Point in Lincolnshire to identify eco systems and flora and fauna living by the coast. The investment in trips and visits is vital to ensuring our pupils have tangible and meaningful learning experiences and the impact continues to be very positive.

The development of oracy skills, has been clear this year with many opportunities that have allowed our pupils to take part in creative learning opportunities. From performing and recording their own poems, that were created in response to curriculum themes to whole class presentations of curriculum work in assemblies, the opportunities have been wonderfully varied. Representation on our student council by Primary pupils and our Secondary pupils attending meetings with local authority representatives to share their views have allowed our pupils to shine. Our pupil choir performing to whole school audiences has also facilitated development of these skills.

Utilising the newly built Immersion Room to support the curriculum has also been effective in engaging our pupils. Learning about the Solar System in Science was made magical and engaging by bringing the planets to life and surrounding the pupils with high quality detailed images. The immersion room has also been enjoyed by our pre-formal learners who have engaged and interacted beautifully with surrounding images of animals, plants and sea life to illustrate their termly topic focus. This new facility has been used extensively and has proven to have a positive impact on many levels.

Our Primary pupils have had many sporting opportunities this year. Our engagement with SEND Active has allowed our pupils to take part in events such as Power Chair Football, Tennis and Trampolining. We also held our own sports camp overnight in school with some primary pupils spending their first night away from home. The distraction of the zip wire and treasure hunt helped everyone enjoy an action-packed evening and exhaustion meant sleeping under canvas was barely noticed. Further afield a group of pupils enjoyed a very successful 3 day residential to the Pioneer



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Activity Centre in Kidderminster. Challenges galore were taken on by the pupils which included Fencing and an assault course. The evenings were just as exciting with a camp fire keeping the pupils warm while they reflected on what they had achieved that day. For many of these pupils this was the longest time ever away from home so that in itself was a huge achievement for some.

Primary and Secondary pupils enjoyed a day at the Tower of London recently — celebrating the end of our the SuperBloom Project that we had successfully been selected to be part of 35 pupils from Reception to KS5 spent a day exploring the Tower and the surrounding moat which was filled with wild flowers and pollinators that had been planted as part of this national project. Our pupils have been busy all year planting seeds, preparing raised beds, and creating Buzz Stops around school whilst learning about how to care for their natural environment. The project has been a huge success with valuable teaching and physical resources being provided or funded through the project. Our pupils also enjoyed taking part in an awards ceremony receiving a plaque for their hard work and involvement in the project and they were also treated to a visit to see the Crown Jewels as part of the celebrations.

Other celebrations this year have included being awarded Arts Mark Gold once again from the Arts Council — the feedback we received from our submission of work recognised our 'commitment to continuing to develop our Arts Provision' and noted that we 'are emerging into a leadership role in the wider educational community' Our Gold status will remain in place until 2025 before we begin a new Arts mark journey. We continue to be committed to ensuring our curriculum is delivered in a creative and imaginative way. Links with community partners such as Open Theatre and Soundabout to support curriculum delivery is vital, as is visiting local spaces such as the Herbert Art Gallery and Warwick Arts Centre that support many elements of our curriculum provision. In addition to our Arts Mark Gold award we were delighted to be awarded Gold Status for our continued commitment and the quality of delivery when taking part in the Shakespeare School Festival. The importance of being part of this national programme is far reaching. It not only supports a wide range of curriculum content and learning outcomes, it has been a big part of the personal development of many of our pupils who we have seen grow so much in confidence by taking part in the project.

On a more individual level the DofE award continues to present many rich learning opportunities to our KS4 and KS5 pupils who are working towards their DofE Bronze and Silver Awards. Most recently a group spent three days away at Island Meadow in Stratford – camping, cooking, fishing, hiking and forging friendships. The resilience, maturity, independence and self-confidence developed in our pupils when given these opportunities is evidenced by staff when back in school, and by parents who have given us such positive feedback about the personal growth their children have experienced.

Personal growth is also in abundance when we consider the impact of the Sherbourne Fields Angling Programme in partnership with the British Angling Association. This year another group of KS4 pupils have had the opportunity to join the programme and within a short time we were able to measure the positive engagement, interaction and interest shown by the group. As the group have developed their skills and they have keenly articulated the processes they have been involved in.



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Their knowledge has been impressive, but just as importantly is their huge sense of achievement when they have had a successful catch after demonstrating patience and application of new learning in the great outdoors. We hope that the Angling programme will spark a potential new interest for some pupils but at the very least we have seen the growth in self-confidence and self-belief which we feel will be far reaching both now and in the future.

Our World Class Schools status has again been cemented with more pupils having their achievements recognised by this national body. Pupil of the month was awarded to a further 3 pupils this year, for their personal achievements which made us very proud and last week we were overjoyed to receive notification that one of our Post 16 pupils has been awarded the incredible recognition of receiving World Class Schools, Pupil of the Year. We are incredibly proud of all of our pupils' achievements and feel the personal growth alongside the academic progress of our winning pupil exemplifies the story of many of our amazing pupils at Sherbourne Fields.

Our established and ever-growing Apiary now with six Bee Hives has been supported by pupils from Primary and Secondary following both the semi-formal and the formal curriculum pathways. As we have been able to evidence so much valuable new learning being introduced with this great resource we will continue to implement parts of our Science and Horticulture curriculums with our Apiary. The opportunity to develop enterprise, Maths and ICT skills through Bee Keeping is also part of the learning with pupils raising vital funds to support the Bees by harvesting and selling their Honey. As prize winners at the Coventry Bee Keepers Association annual honey show pupils and staff, (Jo especially) should be very proud of their achievements this year.

The Bumblebee Conservation Trust was also supported by our pupils earlier in the year through an enterprise afternoon, with pre-learning lessons on the importance of these pollinators. Due to our pupils' efforts in both learning and fund raising Sherbourne has been awarded Bee Friendly status!

Wider fundraising activities have been plentiful this year with KS3 supporting the local charity Carriers of Hope, who support Refugees, Asylum Seekers and other Migrants new to the City following their Humanities topic, Migration to Coventry.

Awareness of the City of Coventry is essential in preparing our pupils for adult life and part of that is to feel that you are an important part of your local community. Some of our older pupils have again been a very important voice in the city, taking part in the Ambassadors meetings Friargate to contribute to plans for out of school provision. The experience this gives our pupils is key to their wider development. This sense of self is also supported through our Work Experience programme which has been hugely successful this year — Coventry Rugby Club, Coventry Food Bank, Crow Recycling, Evtech Automotive and the White Lion pub all gave our pupils a rich and challenging experience. The knowledge and skills that our pupils had learnt in school were put to the test in real life situations and we were thrilled when the feedback all of our pupils received was overwhelmingly positive.



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More positive praise has been received by our secondary sports teams who have once again also enjoyed much success this year taking part in a range of tournaments including Table Cricket and Power Chair football supported by West Brom. A group of KS4 pupils also took part in Tennis lessons at the Kenilworth Tennis Club and were attentive and enthusiastic developing their skills every week. We are always incredibly proud of how our students present themselves at competitions and this year has been no exception!

An in-house competition was enjoyed by pupils across school with a Swimming Challenge set by Mark, our swimming coach. Our pupils were challenged with swimming the combined distance the Channel and they did not fail to impress with some pupils taking part in additional lunchtime swims to ensure they made it. This whole school challenge was a wonderful way to illustrate to our pupils what can be achieved together and they were rightly very proud of their achievements.

The Climbing Wall and Zip Wire have once again been a great success in supporting the personal development of our pupils this year alongside illustrating key concepts in our maths and Science curriculums. Pupils from across the school have attempted the climb, experiencing huge amounts of pride in their achievements whether that be taking an initial step onto the wall, being supported to reach a certain height or conquering the entire face independently. As always bravery and determination has been developed with many pupils surprising themselves with their achievement.

Secondary pupils following our semi-formal curriculum in KS3 have been out exploring the local area around school as well as investigating our in-school resources as source material for their own school prospectus. They have developed their digital literacy and ICT skills as well as their communication and social skills. The same groups have completed their Junior Dukes Award by taking part in a range of different sporting activities. They did extremely well, learning to use the facilities in our gym and now attend Gym Club!

Our Wedge Workshop pupils have to be mentioned for their hard work and commitment to developing new skills on their NOCN Skills for Employability course. They have continued to make a range of items for use across school and are well on their way to making some great items to sell at the Annual School BBQ, which we are determined will go ahead in sunny September! This course continues to provide a wealth of knowledge, develops new skills and offers an experience unlike any others within school. We have our new cohort ready to start the course in September and as ever pupils across school aspire to getting onto the course when they go into post 16.

Another activity that many pupils aspire to be part of is the annual Sherbourne Challenge. This year the challenge didn't involve climbing a mountain but did involve coasteering along a stretch of the Devon coast on day one, followed by a 12mile hike along a coastal path day two and finished on day three with paddle boarding on another coastal stretch. The pupils were remarkable, demonstrating resilience, bravery and sheer determination. In addition to the physical and mental challenge they undertook they also had the challenge of preparing and cooking an evening meal and lunches. It was a privilege to be part of this challenge and witness the pupils achieve so much enabling them to shine and return to school with such pride that will stay with them always.



I have to mention our wonderful pupil in Post 16 – who passed his driving test earlier in the year and now drives confidently to and from school each day. The staff in post 16 gave up time to support this pupil in learning his theory and his hard work paid off.

We have celebrated all of our wonderful pupils in our Achievement Assemblies this year and it has been made been made even more special since the Spring Term when we have been welcoming families back into school in person.

As we have grown our building has taken shape to ensure our pupils have learning areas that allow them to flourish. The new addition of the Primary PMLD class, the immersion room and the new hygiene suite has really enhanced the experience of our most vulnerable pupils. Our new class in the Primary corridor provides an effective learning space with flooded with light and easy access to the outdoors and our new KS3 class is spacious and modern again ensuring our pupils are in the environment they deserve. The newly opened entrance to the school and our new electronic gates offers further security for our pupils. This area is also home for our Wedge Café, which will be re-opening in the Autumn Term offering those vital skills of employability to our pupils in our secondary dept. Plans are now afoot for an extension of our current Post 16 block to create teaching spaces for KS5 and KS4 to ensure they have the space, resources and the provision needed to continue to deliver the range of courses we offer. A new library and sensory story pod are also in our plans and after a hugely successful fund-raising event was hosted by the parents of our youngest child in school, raising more than 15k to fund this exciting addition to our school we are well on our way to making this happen. A huge THANKYOU to all of those who supported this event and by doing so will be making something magical happen.

So finally, I would also like to say a huge THANKYOU to our staff team for enabling our pupils to achieve so much and for being so child focused in ensuring each day is filled with positive learning opportunities.

Key Stage 3 New

This has been another busy term for Key Stage 3, we have enjoyed a variety of trips out in the community which have been linked to our curriculum and helped pupils develop a deeper understanding of what they are learning. Jo and Cindy's classes enjoyed their trip to Stratfordupon-Avon where they consolidated their learning about William Shakespeare and the text A Midsummer Night's Dream. The class explored how Shakespeare's work has inspired writers for generations and even stories such as The Lion King and Toy Story contain references and narratives from Shakespeare's work. While Emma's class were in Stratford-upon-Avon they also got to experience a chain ferry crossing which linked to their Humanities learning about rivers and canals. The class were able to watch a boat going through a lock and gain an understanding of how boats travel up and down hills.

We also held a Year 9 camp at school, which for some pupils was their first experience of staying away from home. Pupils enjoyed an evening of sporting activities and music in the sun, a go down the zip wire, dinner cooked on the open fire and a night in a tent. The pupils took this all in their stride and woke up bright and early after a good night sleep.

In Music this term pupils have been studying rock music and creating rock compositions with an accompanying music video. We have listened to a range of bands including Led Zepplin, AC/DC and Foo Fighters and these bands have influenced our compositions. We've enjoyed the good weather and practiced our songs outside. Pupils have explored the electric guitar and also studied song arrangements in order to create their own track.









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Pupils have also had many opportunities to attend sporting events both in and out of school. We have had coaches in to train with some classes, wheelchair rugby sessions, table cricket sessions as well as many pupils attending SEND active events. Well done to you all on your sportsmanship and courteous behavior during these sessions. Travis' class particularly enjoyed their time going to Kenilworth Lawn Tennis Club and building their tennis skills over a few weeks. They showed good ability, picked up the rules well and came back to school exhausted from working so hard. This helped them gain some more experience of Physical Exercise which was the focus of their Prince's Trust unit this term.



This term we enjoyed taking part in our History Project in collaboration with President Kennedy school. This is a week when we focus on a historical era or significant event and learn as much as we can about it, this year our focus was on 'Empire to Commonwealth' where we sensitively explored what the British Empire was and how decolonisation occurred leading to the formation of the Commonwealth. We learned that the Commonwealth countries have shared values of democracy, human rights, and rule of law and are all seen as equal and free. We explored which countries are in the Commonwealth and looked at cultural art, dance and music from a selection of them. Of course, we also held our own Commonwealth games!



As well as these events pupils have continued to gain experience on our climbing wall and zip wire, and some have ventured into our Apiary for a lesson on Bee Keeping. Linzi's class went to the Apiary to check on the bees, learn more about them and harvest the honeycomb. Carla's class did a fantastic job at helping in preparation to spin and jar the honey, they followed instructions brilliantly and showed some good skills in this area. They have also worked hard on improving

their outdoor spaces and shown creativity in how this has been done.

What a brilliant year! Best wishes to our Year 9's moving in to Key Stage 4 next year, it has been a challenging three years, but you have taken it all in your stride and continued to make fantastic progress both academically and personally.
