Class 3.1

This term Class 3.1 have worked incredibly hard across their curriculum. In Prince's Trust they have completed a unit on Money Management, learning about pay, deductions, outgoings and prioritising payments. In Maths, the Class have focused on learning how to tell the time and answering questions about time. They have also looked at different types of angles and how to identify them.

In Science last half term, Class 3.1 learned about sounds, they explored how it travelled and how we hear it. The Class made a speaker to see if they could amplify sound. In English the topic last half term was persuasive texts. The Class explored advertisements and the language which is used within them. Pupils focused on the use of language and then used this knowledge to write a persuasive letter to me to ask if they could go on the zipwire. This linked to their learning this term in Citizenship about democracy and how this works in the UK. The class were fortunate enough to go on a trip to The Houses of Parliament in London and watched live debates in the House of Lords and the House of Commons. This was an unforgettable experience and brought their learning to life. Another wonderful term Class 3.1, well done!

Class 3.2

This term in English Class 3.2 have been looking at persuasive writing in non-fiction texts. We have looked at a variety of adverts in order to identify the use of rhetorical questions and adjectives to sell a product or idea. We then produced a video and a variety of persuasive text ourselves using the skills we researched, and figurative language - such as alliteration, similes and metaphors. In Mathematics we have been working on partitioning, ratio, division and split strategy addition using 2 and 3-digit numbers.

Science this term has seen the class look at how sound/vibration travels through sound waves. We have looked at the inner ear anatomy and understood how vibration allows the brain to interpret these waves depending on size and shape. In the second half of the term we have been looking at plant reproduction and the detailed structure of plants. This year the class have been completing their Prince's Trust. This term the unit is 'managing money' and looking at budgets, personal spending and developing a greater knowledge of financial services.

In My Religion and Culture we have been looking at routines, and the special routines that ourselves and other people follow. The Class have been exploring dance and gaining confidence in their ability to perform a variety of dance moves. For ICT day we got to work with some visitors from Microsoft who helped us to use Microbits, Circuits and Playground Express to build on our coding skills, create, interact and have fun. 




Sherboarne

ENTERPRISE


It has been an extremely enterprising term here at Sherbourne Fields. Pupils within Key Stage 5 have been working hard towards their Enterprise accreditation.
